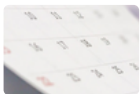

We are grateful to the students who came along to provide support to those in Grades 5 and 6 who attended.

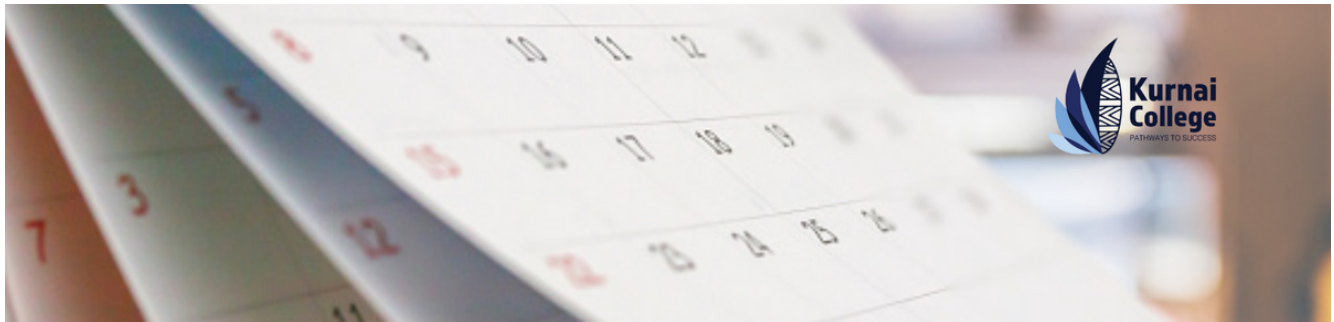
Year 10 students from Morwell Campus are currently on Work Experience placements, expanding their understanding of the world of work and future career pathways. The feedback for these has been exceptional and we are positive that the students are gaining important and significant learning. For some, this will solidify their future pathway. For others, it will reinforce some things they do not want to do in the future. Some students are being offered employment from their placements. Whatever the outcome, the learning that comes from being on the job site is irreplicable at the school.

All students will soon complete the Department of Education Attitudes to School Survey. This is one of our most important information-gathering tools. It is mandatory to complete annually and the information helps us to understand how our actions as a school are meeting the needs of our students. This guides our support structures, learning processes, and curriculum materials. If you have any questions or concerns about the survey or your child's participation in it, please don't hesitate to contact me. Individual responses in the Attitudes to School Survey are confidential and the school only has access to cohort data.

Families may have noticed that despite works being completed at the front of the school, our flags are not currently flying. On Friday, 2nd June, in recognition of Reconciliation Week, we will raise the flags for the first time in front of the new buildings. On this occasion, we will be breaking protocol to raise the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags without the Australian flag, recognising the connection our school strives to have with our community and First Nations peoples. That week, all students will engage in activities in the spirit of reconciliation, promoting our hope to be a school where all students feel safe, included, and valued.

To save someone's life, they put this machine on them called a defibrillator and you must back away because if they have no heartbeat, they will get electrocuted. If their heart is

still beating, then the voice on the machine will tell you and you will have to go back to giving them CPR. – Jack Caia-Mills

generator and store renewable powers. They then applied this knowledge to a final challenge, where they were required to power a city for 24 hours with low cost and low CO2 emissions.



Students will take this knowledge back to the classroom as they will begin to prepare their presentations for the 24-Hour Energy Breakthrough event in Maryborough.

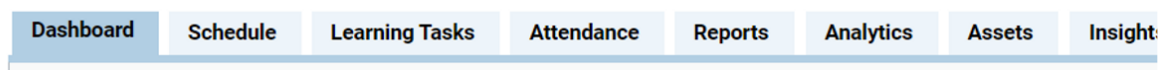
Accessing Learning Task Feedback on Compass

Teachers will provide feedback to parents and students at least once per term.

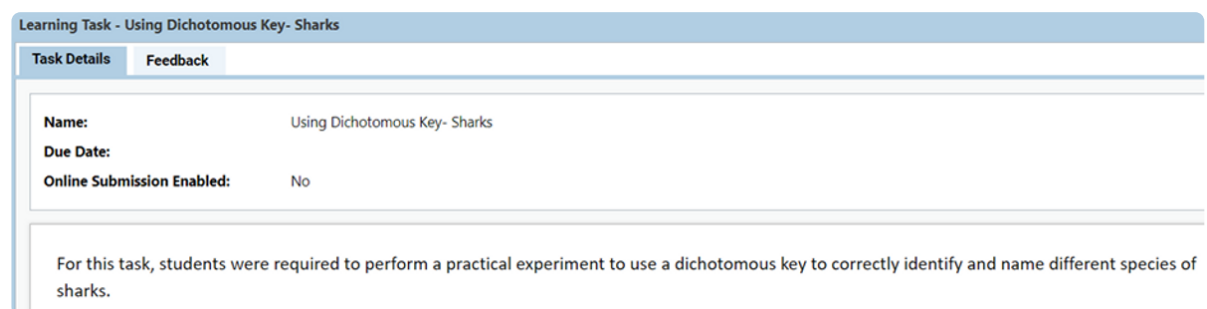
Parents/Carers will receive an SMS from the teacher when this feedback is available.

CSEF

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) provides payments for eligible students to attend activities like:

- school camps or trips
- swimming and school-organised sports programs
- outdoor education programs
- excursions and incursions.

From 2020, the Victorian Government is investing an additional \$160.9 million for the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund over the next four years. This funding will help ensure more than 220,000 government and non-government students from lower-income families can participate in camps, sports and excursions each year.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for the Camps, Sports & Excursions Fund (CSEF). The amount paid is \$225 for secondary school students.



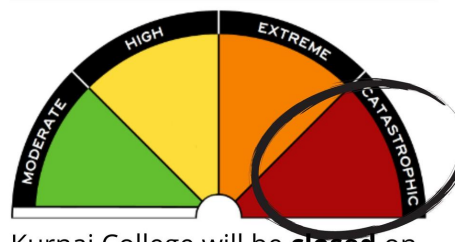

Code Red Fire Danger

A reminder to all families, that on days of **Code Red** in the West & South Gippsland Fire Zone, all campuses will be closed.

This is a change to previous years, and we ask families to be aware of this in preparation to when Summer returns.

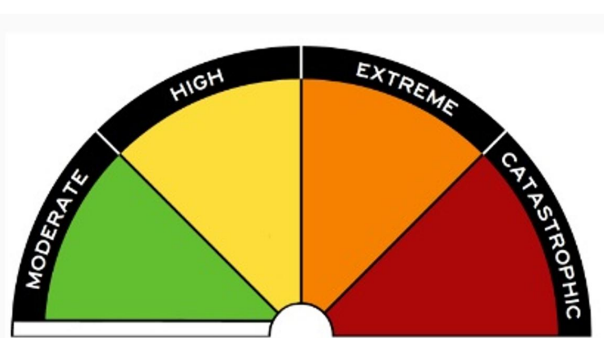


Kurnai College will be **closed** on days of **Catastrophic (Code Red)** Fire Rating

Bushfire Preparedness

Schools on the Bushfire At-Risk Register and Schools at Risk of Grassfire (Category 4)

Fire danger ratings and warnings are used in Victoria to provide clear direction on the safest options for preserving life.



Schools and children's services listed on the DET Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR) and those at risk of grassfire (Category 4) will be closed when a Code Red fire danger rating day (Catastrophic) is determined in their Bureau of Meteorology district. **Our school has been identified as being one of those at high bushfire or grassfire risk.**

Where possible, we will provide parents with up to four days notice of a potential Code Red day closure by Compass or SMS. A Code Red day will be determined by the Emergency Management Commissioner no later than 1.00 pm the day before the potential closure. Once we are advised of the confirmation of the Code Red day (Catastrophic) we will provide you with advice before the end of the school day.

Once confirmed, the decision to close will not change, regardless of improvements in the weather forecast. This is to avoid confusion and help your family plan alternative care arrangements for your child. It is also important to note that:

- No staff will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Code Red day (Catastrophic).
- School camps will be cancelled if a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined for the Bureau of Meteorology district in which the camp is located.

- All bus routes that travel through the Code Red area will be cancelled.
- Depending on which Bureau of Meteorology district is impacted bus route cancellations may affect our school.

On these Code Red days families are encouraged to enact their Bushfire Survival Plan – **on such days children should never be left at home alone or in the care of older children.**

For those of us living in a bushfire prone area, the Country Fire Authority (CFA) advises that when Code Red days are forecast, the safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Code Red day .

As part of preparing our school for potential hazards such as fire, we have updated and completed our Emergency Management Plan, re-prioritised any maintenance works that may assist in preparing for the threat of fire and cleared our facility's grounds and gutters.

What can parents do?

- Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements in the event that our school is closed.
- Ensure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers. Keep in touch with us by reading our newsletters, by checking our website kurnai.co and by talking to your child's teacher or any other member of the teaching staff about our emergency management plan.
- Most importantly at this time of year, if you're planning a holiday or short stay in the bush or in a coastal area, you should check warnings in advance of travel and remain vigilant during your stay.
- If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan.

Is your teenager struggling to attend school due to anxiety, depression or emotional distress?

Be among the first to trial a new online parenting program designed to support parents of teens struggling with school attendance.

Researchers from Monash University and Deakin University are offering parents a **FREE online parenting program** designed to support parents of teenagers who have difficulty attending school due to anxiety, depression, or emotional distress (sometimes called 'school refusal', 'school angst', or 'school phobia'). The program is being offered as part of a research trial.

What's included in the program?

- A parenting and assessment tool with personalized feedback
- Up to 13 online modules with practical strategies to support your teen's mental health and school attendance
- Complete weekly modules and work towards goals

Who can take part?

- You may be eligible to participate if:
 - you are the parent or guardian of a teenager aged 12-18
 - you are in Australia
 - you can read, write, and speak in English
 - you have regular access to the internet

The program is not recommended as a sole source of support for young people experiencing school refusal. We recommend seeking professional support from a mental health or educational professional alongside completing the program. Although all parents are able to take part, please also note that the program content is not tailored for parents of teenagers with Autism Spectrum Disorder or intellectual disability.

What else is involved?

To help us evaluate the program, we'll ask you to complete two online surveys about your parenting and your teen's mental health. We may also invite you to complete an interview about your experience with the program. You'll receive a \$20 gift voucher after completing the second survey, and an additional \$20 gift voucher if you complete an interview.
